INSTRUCTION

Singing activities and games, the playing of instruments, movement experiences, listening activities, and creative experiences form the basis of the elementary music curriculum. At this grade level, these activities are designed to introduce, explore, practice, and apply the following concepts and skills:

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • distinguish between steady beat and rhythm • perform rhythm patterns that include quarter notes, paired eighth notes, and quarter rests (from standard notation) • experience the beat of music in duple meter 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • distinguish between high and low sounds (less extreme contrast) • sing and notate melodies using <i>la</i>, <i>so</i>, and <i>mi</i> pitches • identify the <i>music staff</i> • identify melodic direction (up/down) • recognize the relationship between the size of an instrument and its pitch • perform an <i>ostinato</i> (repeated pattern) to accompany singing • experience the sounds of <i>major</i> and <i>minor</i> 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • identify music in AB and ABA forms • experience musical <i>phrase</i> • identify same and different phrases 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • identify and play pitched and non-pitched classroom instruments • distinguish between vocal and instrumental music • distinguish between accompanied and unaccompanied vocal music 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • identify and perform sudden and gradual dynamic (volume) changes • identify and perform sudden and gradual tempo changes

CONNECTIONS
