<p><b>Child Study Committee At A Glance</b></p>	<p><b>What is the Child Study Committee?</b>          Child Study is a team assembled to assess the concerns and needs of any student referred.</p> <p><b>Who are generally members of the Child Study Committee?</b>          Parent/Guardian, Principal/Assistant Principal or designee, Classroom Teacher, Special Education Teacher, and/or others invited by school and/or family.</p> <p><b>What is discussed?</b>          The person who has referred the child will share concerns. All important information regarding your child will be reviewed. Any available medical information provided is considered.</p> <p><b>What is determined?</b>          The team may recommend strategies and/or interventions to be tried in your child's classroom(s).          The team may refer the child for evaluation for eligibility for special education and related services.          The team may determine that no further action is needed.</p>
<p><b>Tips for Preparing</b>  <i>Your school values your contributions.</i></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Take time to reflect on your child's strengths and weaknesses.</li> <li>• Seek your child's input as appropriate.</li> <li>• Compile and submit any private reports you wish to share.</li> <li>• Consider your family's priorities and desired outcomes for this meeting. Use the Talking Points section (below) to help organize your thoughts.</li> <li>• Note any questions you want to remember to ask during the meeting on the Questions section (below).</li> </ul>
<p><b>My Role as a Parent or Guardian</b>  <i>You are an equal and valuable member of the educational team.</i></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Actively participate in discussion at the meeting.</li> <li>• Be comfortable sharing your input, thoughts and any concerns you may have.</li> <li>• Ask questions and seek clarification as needed.</li> </ul> <p><b>NOTE:</b> <i>If an evaluation is recommended, your consent is required before the evaluation can be conducted.</i></p>
